This scholarship program was launched in 2016 by a partnership between Gándara and the city of Springfield's Department of Parks, Buildings, & Recreation Management. It provides kids with the fun, freedom, and excitement that summer camp brings: an opportunity to get outside and make positive connections that will last a lifetime.

For eight-year-old scholarship recipient Justice, the

Artists in Gándara Center's youth residential programs created 54 pieces as part of their art therapy for the event, which also included musical performances.



NEW PROGRAMS



Springfield Peer Recovery Center

Responding to the need to combat the opioid crisis in Springfield, the Massachusetts Department of Health (DPH) awarded Gándara Center \$400,000 in funding to open a recovery support center in the city's downtown on Worthington Street. Data from the DPH shows that the number of deaths from opioid overdoses nearly doubled in 2018, from 56 in 2017 to 108, even though overdose deaths decreased by one percent statewide.

The Springfield Recovery Center program is designed after the peer recovery support centers our agency operates in Holyoke, Brockton, Plymouth, and Hyannis. Our center in Springfield, like our others, welcomes all people in recovery

from substance use and those affected by substance use, and emphasizes peer support, which has always been an important part of Gándara Center's culture of recovery.

All paths to recovery are accepted. Volunteer opportunities will be available for members who are committed to their recovery and actively participate in the center.

Plymouth Peer Recovery Center

In the fall, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, Bureau of Substance Abuse Services awarded Gándara Center a Substance Addiction Peer Recovery Support Center grant for greater Plymouth. For the past two years, Gándara Center has been partnering with the Plymouth Recovery Center, Inc. on Obery Street with the goal of securing state funds to provide a stable funding base for the Center.

The program will move to a centrally located, larger downtown Main Street location—one that that includes parking—in early 2020. Gándara staff will continue to provide outreach support to the Obery Street site, which will remain open at reduced hours. Many of the current Plymouth Recovery Center groups will move to the new site. Gándara Center staff may also provide outreach supports to other sites in Plymouth County.







Avanzando!

Enhanced Residential Rehabilitation Services

Our new Avanzando! Enhanced Residential Rehabilitation Services in Ludlow treats women 18 and older who are experiencing co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders (SUD).

The 20-bed program provides direct linkage to mental health clinical services and SUD treatment in a single setting by the same treatment team, as well as onsite Medically Assisted Treatment, a dedicated point person to facilitate referrals, and daily oversight by a certified peer recovery coach and mental health clinical supervisors.

At Avanzando!, bilingual peer recovery coaches who have been trained by the state's Bureau of Substance Abuse Services are on hand to meet with recoverees who have


been identified as priority by a clinical team due to a recent overdose and/or detox admission.

The Ambassador Project

The Ambassador Project is a problem gambling prevention program funded through the Massachusetts Department of Health's Office of Problem Gambling Services.

The programming involves a peer support model that trains men of color who are in recovery to have gambling prevention conversations with other men of color with a history of substance use. The goal is for them to lead conversations about problem gambling prevention in their communities.

This pioneering approach to gambling education is taking place in the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Bureau of Substance Addiction Services (BSAS)-funded peer recovery support centers that include Gándara's PIER Recovery Center of Cape Cod, our Stairway to Recovery Center in Brockton, and our Hope for Holyoke Recovery Center.

Brighter Futures

Brighter Futures is our new overnight alternative housing program in Springfield for transitional young adults (18-24) who are experiencing—or at risk of—homelessness. The housing, which accommodates five to six youths, was made possible by a state grant through the City of Springfield. Clients are provided with a Housing Specialist and life skills development, which includes budgeting, resume writing, and job and housing search assistance.

"Brighter Futures, with its small, home-like setting, provides a much less intimidating alternative to a traditional homeless shelter," says Emily English, our director of supportive housing programs.

Genoa Healthcare Pharmacy

On September 17, Gándara Center marked the grand opening of a local bilingual pharmacy that assists the agency and its clients with their needs. Genoa Healthcare Pharmacy held a ribbon cutting at Gándara's Outpatient Clinic, 2155 Main Street, Springfield.

Gándara Center's patients, as well as its clinicians, are able to get prescriptions quickly and easily at this unique on-site pharmacy, which offers services specifically tailored to the agency's multicultural clientele.

Being on-site allows pharmacy staff to work closely with Gándara's prescribers and caseworkers to provide the best possible care to those struggling with behavioral health conditions. Personalized bilingual and bicultural help ensure compliance with their treatment plans.

Gándara Center's Stop Access Springfield Coalition Awarded \$125,000 Federal Grant to Fight Youth Substance Use

U.S Congressman Richard E. Neal (D-Springfield), in collaboration with the White House Office National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), announced in November a \$125,000 grant to Gándara Center's Stop Access Springfield Coalition. The award was one of 150 nationwide grants for ONDCP's Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program.

Stop Access Springfield works to reduce youth substance use by creating positive vital communities and implementing citywide strategies that highlight substance use prevention and move it to a priority status in Springfield. The coalition focuses on collection data around youth risk and protective factors including youth alcohol, cannabis, and tobacco use; community capacity building; public health planning to use environmental policy changes to reduce and prevent youth substance use; and implementation of these strategies. The coalition's Youth Advisory Board is actively involved in providing direction to the coalition.

The coalition is coordinated by Gándara Center and funded by a grant from the U.S. Office of National Drug Control Policy and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

Latinx AIDS/HIV Awareness Vigil: Knowledge is Prevention



Gándara Center's Project Health program hosted a National Latinx HIV/AIDS Awareness Day Vigil for the Springfield community on October 18 at Springfield City Hall. Springfield Mayor Domenic J. Sarno spoke, as well as other community leaders,

including Springfield Health and Human Services Commissioner Helen Caulton-Harris. An AIDS awareness flag was raised after the event.

HIV disproportionately affects Latinx communities in the United States: a fifth of people with HIV in the U.S. are Latinx, and a quarter of new HIV infections in this country occur among the Latinx population, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

Project Health provides bilingual case management services for individuals in the area who are HIV positive or who have AIDS. Case managers help those living with HIV/ AIDS to access medical, mental health, and Substance Use Disorder Treatment and provide education to maintaining a healthy, positive lifestyle.

NOEL Program: Preventing Cancer



"More than one million women worldwide will get breast cancer this year," said Ileana Casillas said during her educational session on breast cancer prevention and screening on April 29. Casillas wasn't trying to shock the women in attendance. She was simply stating a sobering fact before reminding them that "the earlier breast cancer is found and diagnosed, the better the chance of beating it."

Casillas, a community health worker in Gándara Center's NOEL (Navigating, Outreach, Education, Linkages) program in Springfield, detailed the three ways to detect breast cancer early: breast self-exams, clinical breast exams, and mammography.

The educational session was part of a Family Planning and Women's Health Fair at the Caring Health Center (CHC) on Main Street in Springfield. The event, which was co-sponsored by CHC, Baystate Health, Gándara Center, and the Mason Square Neighborhood Health Center, provided women with family planning, reproductive health, and general women's health and services information.

NOEL is a community-based prevention and early detection program offering free outreach, education and cancer screenings—specifically colorectal, cervical and breast cancer— to hard-to-reach populations.

Foster Parents: Celebrating the Heroes Who Make a Difference in the Lives of Children in Need

Gándara Center's foster care program places youth in temporary, safe, therapeutic home environments and provides them with intensive case management, transportation, and recreational opportunities. We also provide 24-hour on-call support for families.

Cassandra Joseph, who has been a Gándara foster parent for seven children between 4 and 15 in the last five years, says her experience has been rewarding because she likes giving kids and teens a "second chance" at a happy, healthy life. There are also struggles and challenges, but for those who are sensitive to the children's circumstances—many of them have been removed from their biological parents because of abuse or neglect—the benefits of making a big difference in a child's life are immeasurable.

And Gándara Center works alongside foster families—every step of the way. "I receive a lot of support from Gándara Center," says Cassandra.

"Any help I need—Gándara is right there."

Gándara's team approach involves ongoing consultation and resources, including specialized case managers visiting the foster home once a week, and a family resource manager visiting the home once a month. If needed, our agency's inhome therapists are available to work with the exclusive needs of these children. Also, every one of our foster parents receives 30 hours of high-quality pre-service training, according to Nicole Coughlin, director of intensive foster care at Gándara Center. "Every year, every foster parent completes 20 hours of additional training," says Nicole.

"Intensive foster care is a about finding the right match. We help prepare these families for a successful child placement. That's one reason we enjoy a good retention rate among our foster parents."

Gándara Recovery Centers Celebrate National Recovery Month

Every September, the Gándara Center participates in National Recovery Month, which is sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. This longstanding observance, now in its 30th year, is designed to increase awareness and understanding of mental and substance use disorders, celebrate people in recovery, and laud the contributions of treatment and service providers.

Hope for Holyoke is one of several Gándara recovery support centers that were involved in events in conjunction with National Recovery Month. Hope for Holyoke hosted Holyoke Recovery Day on September 27, and attended the Connecticut Community for Addiction Recovery (CCAR) Walks and Rally in Hartford, CT on September 21 and the Massachusetts Organization for Addiction Recovery (MOAR) celebration in Boston on September 16. 

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


